
Plan a treasure hunt





treasure, coloured paper for clue cards, pencils


- 1. Plan a treasure hunt for a friend.

- 3. Find a place to hide the treasure in your classroom and secretly put it there.
- 4. Write out the clue cards and number them.
- 5. Follow your friend as they try to find the treasure.
- 6. Swap roles!





Treasure hunt map

Plan a treasure hunt. Write your clues on a sheet of paper. Give your clues and map to a friend to solve.



Instructions Ask children to secretly choose a place from the map to hide their treasure. T ell them to write down five clues leading to the treasure and to number each clue. Each child exchanges their map and clues with a partner to find the treasure.
